

**KEYNOTE SPEAKER: Billy Mills**



William “Billy” Mills, also known as **Tamakoce Te'Hila**, is an Oglala Lakota former track and field athlete who won a gold medal in the 10,000 meter run (6.2 mi) at the 1964 Tokyo Olympics. His 1964 victory is considered one of the greatest Olympic upsets because he was a virtual unknown going into the event. He was the first non-European to win the Olympic event and remains the only winner from the Americas. A United States Marine, Mills is a member of the Oglala Sioux Tribe.

### Time to Talk About Trafficking – A Youth-Led Perspective-WAVI-Working Against Violence, Inc.

Youth leaders in our area are working to educate on topics that are relevant to them but are sometimes difficult for adults to talk about. It's time we, as educators, follow their lead and begin to have conversations with young people about the dangers and struggles our youth face.

Take ACTION is a youth led theatre group that writes, performs, and presents short films on topics they are passionate about. In the past 9 years, Rapid City area high school students have created numerous skits, 6 live action short films, 2 illustrated short films, and have presented to their peers at Freshman Impact and other youth events throughout the state. Students involved in this group will show their short film "Not for Sale", showcasing four fictional stories of human trafficking.

The Youth Action Board's mission statement is, "We are a youth led group that advocates, educates, learns, uses, and gains resources to create a positive change in the ongoing housing challenges youth and young adults face in our community." Their vision statement is, "Change starts somewhere, why not here." Many of the youth involved in the Youth Action Board have lived experience with being unhoused, which is a large risk factor for human trafficking. After the short film, youth from Take ACTION and the Youth Action Board will discuss why they believe human trafficking is important for youth to know about, how they think educators can best discuss this with their students, the importance of youth led initiatives and youth voices, and more.

Why are Tribal Colleges & Universities Involved in the Land Business?

Phil Baird and Shawn Bordeaux, Sinte Gleska University and Dr. Barry Dunn, President, South Dakota State University (invited).

This presentation will provide an historical overview about TCUs as "1994 land grant institutions" authorized by P.L. 103-382, the Equity in Education Land Grant Status of 1994. This Congressional action recognized the mission and goal of Tribal Nation-building among TCUs. Land grant funding through the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has helped establish teaching, extension, food sovereignty initiatives (including bison), new beginnings for Tribal college students, and research programs for land and human resources. Questions about TCU land grant status will be invited so as to create a better understanding about why TCUs are involved in Tribal land business and community development.

Researchers often want to study life on the Reservation. However, it's important to have them submit their research plans and request authorization for the research. Sinte Gleska University and the Sicangu Tribal Education department set up a Higher Education Research Review Board (HERRB). In this session, we'll share our process for reviewing research applications, promoting cultural sensitivity, and protecting data sovereignty.
